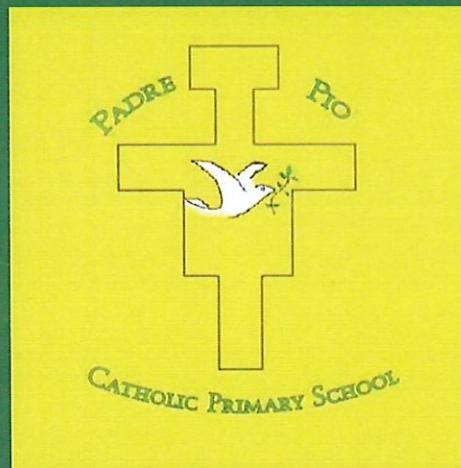

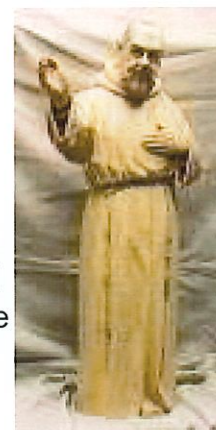

## Our Patron Saint, Padre Pio

Padre Pio was born May 25, 1887 in Pietrelcina, Italy, a small country town located in southern Italy. He was given the name Francesco and did not become known as Pio until he became a Franciscan at the age of 15. On August 10th, 1910, Friar Pio was ordained a priest and became known as Padre Pio.



Despite suffering from poor health, Padre Pio dedicated his life to serving others and to serving God. Padre Pio died on September 23rd 1968. On June 16th 2002, Pope John Paul II declared Padre Pio to be a saint and his feast day is celebrated on September 23rd each year.

The dedication of Padre Pio was chosen for the new school due to the Governing Body wanting to recognise the tremendous work of the Franciscan Friars who came to Pontypool in the middle of the nineteenth century and established the parishes and schools of the Eastern Valleys. While it was felt that there was a need to recognise this past tradition there was also a need to be contemporary, hence choosing a Franciscan saint who died in the comparatively recent past, in 1968.

The mosaic, situated on the front wall of the school, was constructed by local artist Stephanie Roberts. It is in the form of the Franciscan Cross, and not only respects the history of the Catholic community in Pontypool but also incorporates contemporary approaches in the use of stained glass and lead work. It symbolises how the gospel preached by the Franciscan Friars in the past is not something just for the past but which also needs to be preached today and in the future.

Padre Pio Catholic Primary School was founded by and is part of the Catholic Church. It is a voluntary aided co-educational day school for children aged 4-11 years in the Archdiocese of Cardiff and is maintained by Torfaen Local Authority. It serves the Roman Catholic Parish of St. Alban's. The Governing Body of Padre Pio School is the admissions authority for this school. Our aim is to provide a high-quality Christian education based on the teachings of Christ in the Gospels.

Padre Pio is an English medium Catholic school. However, we are very aware of our role, as a school in Wales, in promoting and developing the use of Welsh as a living language. In addition to sessions where we teach Welsh as a second language, the school tries to promote the language as the working language of the school. Simple instructions (sit on the carpet / line up at the door) are given through the medium of Welsh, where pupils hear the language and respond to it through action. Staff and pupils greet each other throughout the day using the medium of Welsh and pupils are encouraged and supported to use the short sentence patterns they know outside of the classroom, in the playground.

All members of staff have been trained to teach Welsh as a second language. Training is supported by the peripatetic teacher who assists both pupils and staff.

The prospectus is designed to provide parents with the information about our school as required by The Education Act (1980) and The Education Reform Act (1988). The details contained herein are correct at the time of printing.

## **Public Access to Information**

In accordance with the Data Protection Act 2018 and the General Data Protection Regulation, individuals have the right to be informed about how the school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing privacy notices and this notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about individuals at the school.

The school retains records on each individual child. These provide a personal and academic profile as progression is made throughout each year. The records are available for parents to inspect at school and copies can be made to take away, should this prove necessary.

It is a statutory obligation that pupil records should be made available within 15 days, but normally it is possible to arrange for them to be seen more quickly than this.

Parents who wish to inspect documents relating to the school's curriculum should contact the Headteacher as all are available to view. Many of the more significant policies are available to view on our website. Please note there may be a cost for multiple data information requests to cover photocopying and administration time. ## **Admission Arrangements 2025-26**

**Parents considering sending their child(ren) to Padre Pio should contact the school office for information on the admissions process or visit the school website for the application form.**

The policy and arrangements set out below are governed by the relevant parts of education legislation and in accordance with the Articles and Instruments of Government of Padre Pio Catholic Primary School.

The Governing Body has sole responsibility for admissions to the school. The admission number of new entries is 30 as per Welsh Government / Local Authority directives. The minimum age of entry to the school is 4 years provided that the child's 5th birthday falls between 1st September and 31st August of that academic year. Children with a statement of additional learning needs (ALN) naming the school will be admitted before other applicants. When the number of applications is equal to or less than the admission number, all pupils will be admitted. When the number of applications exceeds the admission number, criteria will be applied in priority order — please visit the school website or call the school office on 01495 742074 for a copy of the school's admission policy.

Completed application forms for children due to enter Reception class in September 2026 must be received at the school before the deadline of 15 January 2026, 5pm. Late applications will be considered, but only after all applications lodged on or before the deadline have been considered, and consequently late applicants may lose priority.

## **Right of Appeal**

Details of the procedure to be followed if an appeal against a decision of the Governing Body on admission is contemplated may be obtained from the Admissions Appeal Committee c/o the school office.

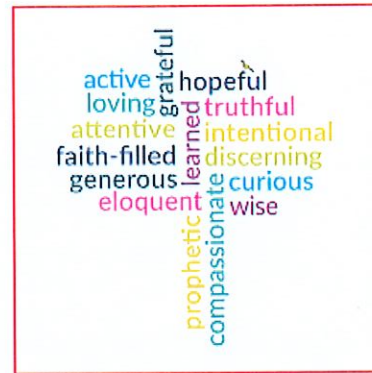

- **Compassionate** towards others, near and far, especially the less fortunate; and **loving** by their just actions and forgiving words;
- **Faith-filled** in their beliefs and **hopeful** for the future;
- **Eloquent** and **truthful** in what they say of themselves, the relations between people, and the world;
- **Learned**, finding God in all things; and **wise** in the ways they use their learning for the common good;
- **Curious** about everything; and **active** in their engagement with the world, changing what they can for the better;
- **Intentional** in the way they live and use the resources of the earth, guided by conscience; and **prophetic** in the example they set to others.

## **Religious Education**

Religious education (RE) is at the core of everything we do in Padre Pio School and 10% of teaching time is dedicated to Curriculum RE.

We are a proud Welsh Catholic school where the teachings of Jesus guide every aspect of school life and inspire a journey of lifelong learning. We are an inclusive community, committed to excellence and to nurturing the unique, God-given gifts of every pupil. We also recognise and celebrate that our pupils come from a range of backgrounds and have differing abilities, and our teaching of Religious Education reflects this.

We value parents and carers as first educators. Parents provide their children with the safety and security that they need to develop as people and in the context of that loving relationship, the children will begin to grasp the great truth of God's love.

The school, in conjunction with the parents and Parish, will help foster and develop an understanding of this truth. Our role is a supportive one building on the faith experience. Our whole task is to help the children grow in independence and to develop a greater capacity to make the right choices. It is the love encountered both in the family and school that will then be extended to the community.

In school, religious education is taught through regular lessons, the season of the Church's year, various liturgies, assemblies, and not least, by the attempt to create a school ethos which reflects the value of the Gospel.

## **Collective Worship**

The Education Act (1988) states that all children attending school should take part in a daily act of collective worship. In Padre Pio this act of worship is varied throughout the week.

Monday: Whole School- based on Gospel Reading  
Tuesday: Individual class acts of worship  
Wednesday: Hymn practice/worship  
Thursday: Separate age- phase acts of worship  
Friday: Whole School 'Praise' Assembly (certificates presented for good work, behaviour, etc.)

## **Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE)**

In Padre Pio, RSE is taught through a variety of teaching methods. It is taught in discreet lessons, in cross curricular lessons, particularly R.E. and science, and fundamentally embedded in the ethos of the school through assemblies, classroom discussions and the centring of all relationships in school on the person of Jesus Christ. The programme of study is based on the teachings of the Church and aims to help young people develop their sense of purpose and character and uses schemes of work endorsed by Archdiocese of Cardiff.

RSE will be taught, using a wide range of teaching strategies, clear ground rules for discussions will be established, parents will be informed, and lessons will always take account of the safeguarding policy.

The Church recognises parents as the first educators of their children. Children's first experience of relationships and love are in the home. At Padre Pio we seek to work with parents and support them as their children grow and begin to develop their own character as well as experiencing changes in their physical appearance. Parents have been consulted about this policy through the school newsletter, a parents' meeting and via the school website before it was ratified by the governing body.

The school will involve and support parents in learning about RSE by sharing the programme of study/published resources to be used, letters when visitors are coming to school, letters when a sensitive subject is to be taught, resources to use at home, information in school prospectus and on school website, listening to questions etc. In addition, there will be an online parent platform so that you, as parent and carers, can engage with the teaching and enhance the experience for your child.

Parents do not have the right to withdraw their children from RSE lessons.

In addition, the School Nurse visits in the summer term to speak to the children in year 6 about puberty. It is important that they respect themselves and others. The importance of their experience of relationships cannot be over emphasised. As well as rules and guidelines for behaviour that we offer them, we should help them to realise why we are telling them what is 'right' and 'wrong'.

## School Discipline and Behaviour

Emphasis is placed on good manners, respect for others, correct speech and personal appearance. Behaviour within the school and its surroundings is based upon the safety of the individual child and consideration for others. There is a written policy on discipline which is available from school. Pupils are regularly reminded of these requirements by their class teachers. Minor misdemeanours are dealt with as good, caring parents would deal with their own child. When incidents of a serious nature occur, the parent will be informed immediately, so that we may work together to eradicate such behaviour.

At all times we stress the positive behaviour of the child. For example:  
We try to 'catch' children being good and emphasise this through praise and class rewards;  
Good work is displayed;  
Each class has 2 'pupils of the week', for which they receive a certificate.

As a parent, you are the first educator of your child. You set the essential first example for your child in your witness to the faith and your standard of behaviour. Your parental example is followed by your child and is reflected in their behaviour in school. It is vital that you realise the importance of the example you set to your child.

At Padre Pio School we believe that a Catholic school is distinguished by the quality of care extended to all its members. Your child will be expected to show respect to the adults and children they meet during the school day. We will expect others, in turn, to show this respect to your child. If your child is not happy for any reason please make sure the school knows.

Your child will be better able to play their full role in school if they:  
have had a good night's sleep having gone to bed at a reasonable time;  
have had an adequate breakfast or, if breakfast is refused, fruit has been provided for break time;  
have been sent to school in a happy frame of mind;  
have been sent to school at the expected time (8.55am);  
have not been encouraged to retaliate (your child should not "hit back");  
have been encouraged to treat others with respect and to consider their feelings;  
have had their problems, including those of health, explained to the school class teacher before they escalate;  
have been encouraged to follow the rules laid out in the prospectus (uniform, no jewellery, returning school books, etc.).

## Sanctions

Although rewards are central to the encouragement of good behaviour, realistically there is a need for sanctions to register the disapproval of unacceptable behaviour. In an environment where respect is central, loss of respect, or disapproval, is a powerful punishment. Sanctions will always be based on the Catholic values of justice, dignity and peace.

The use of punishment should be characterised by certain features:

It must be clear why the sanction is being applied;

It must be made clear what changes in behaviour are required to avoid future punishment;

Group sanctions should be avoided as they breed resentment;

There should be a clear distinction between minor and major offences;

It should be the behaviour rather than the person that is punished;

Knowledge of the child is used to measure the level of behaviour using a scale of 1-10 in order to ensure that the sanction is not out of proportion to the offence.

Sanctions range from expressions of disapproval, through withdrawal of privileges, for example, moving to sit alone, loss of playtime and loss of responsibility, to referral to the Headteacher, letters to parents and, ultimately and in the last resort, exclusion (following LA guidelines).

To try to ensure a sanction is proportionate, behaviours have been sorted into three groups:

A. Low level Behaviour including:

chatting; calling out; swinging on chairs; wandering around classroom; talking when others are talking; fussing and fidgeting; making noises; interrupting/distracting others; making faces/gestures; tapping pencils.

B. Mid level behaviour including:

repeating any of the above when asked not to; pushing/shoving; answering back/mumbling under breath; spoiling someone's work; name-calling; refusing to follow instructions; throwing rubbers/small objects; put-downs.

C. High Level Behaviour (these incidents must always be recorded):

persisting in any of above (Mid) having been asked to stop; swearing; leaving classroom without permission; stealing; breaking/damaging property on purpose; hitting/kicking/punching; fighting; throwing objects to hurt someone; racism; bullying.

Parents will be involved at the earliest possible stage, if problems are persistent or recurring. Children may then be placed on a daily or weekly report system to monitor their behaviour with parents' support. Where anti-social, disruptive or aggressive behaviour is frequent, additional specialist help and advice from the Educational Psychologist or Inclusion Service is sought.

## Communication and Parental Partnership

We give high priority to clear communication within the school and to a positive partnership with parents since we believe that these are crucial in promoting and maintaining high standards of behaviour. Where the behaviour of a child is giving cause for concern it is important that all those working with the child are aware of those concerns and of the steps which are being taken in response. The key professional in this process of communication is the class teacher who has the initial responsibility for the child's welfare. Early warning of concerns should be communicated to the Headteacher so that strategies can be discussed and agreed before more formal steps are required.

## **Additional Learning Needs**

As a child goes through school - whether primary or secondary there may be times when he or she will need extra help and support in some area of learning. For example, there could be difficulties with reading, writing, spelling or maths. A child may need this extra help for only a short time or for quite a long period. In order to help each pupil to reach his or her full potential, there is a special school policy document which aims to cater for these differing situations. This document is called the Additional Learning Needs Policy. Below is just a brief outline of the main points.

### Our aims in teaching children with ALN are as follows:

Additional learning needs provision is based on a whole school policy drawn up by governors, senior management, teaching staff and non-teaching staff. All members of the school staff are committed to its successful implementation.

The Governing Body and staff will ensure that all pupils have access to a broad and balanced differentiated curriculum which meets individual needs and will have regard to the Code of Practice when implementing ALN provision, both for children with Local Authority or School Individual Development Plans (IDPs) and those with One Page Profiles with Targets.

The needs of the child must be made known to all those likely to teach the child.

Teachers must be made aware of the importance of identification and provision and be responsible for the assessment of needs.

The Governing Body aims to report annually to parents on the school's ALN policy and its implementation. This must be monitored.

It must be ensured that each child with ALN joins in activities within the school, so far as is compatible with children who are not deemed to have ALN.

## **Strategic Equality Plan**

The Governing Body is fully committed to the principles of inclusivity and will examine and cater for specific needs as they arise, within the school's capabilities. The school's Strategic Equality Plan reinforces our mission statement of 'A Catholic family where we pray and learn in peace with each other. Together, we take the message of Jesus to the world'. Copies of the school's Strategic Equality Plan are available on written request to the school. There may be a charge for this in line with the school's Charging Policy.

The equality objectives set in our Strategic Equality Plan (SEP) 2025 – 2028 are:

- To ensure all staff and governors improve their understanding of anti-racism and their roles and responsibilities
- To ensure that pupils who belong to protected groups have equal and consistent access to school
- To ensure that pupils from protected groups do not experience educational disadvantage

## **Safeguarding**

Padre Pio Catholic Primary School recognises that we have a duty to safeguard and to promote the welfare of our pupils. This responsibility requires a Safeguarding Policy and appropriate procedures. This means that the school may need to share information and work in partnership with other agencies if there are concerns about a child's welfare. A copy of our Safeguarding Policy is available for parents or carers to see. The School's Designated Child Protection Officer, Mrs N McGinty, the Headteacher, is happy to discuss any concerns parents may have about Safeguarding /Child Protection Policies and practice. The appointment of all staff and volunteers is subject to a DBS check. Staff are aware and act upon the guidelines as laid down in the Safeguarding Policy and Health and Safety Policy.

## **Children Looked After (CLA)**

Mrs H. Jones, ALNCo, has designated responsibility for promoting the educational achievement of children who are looked after. The school has adopted an Admissions Policy that gives priority in each criterion to looked after children/previously looked after children.

## **Child Welfare**

Several of the community services work in partnership with our school including the Health Service (see below), Police, and Social Services. Occasionally situations arise, concerning child welfare, when advice is sought by the school from these bodies. Also, from time to time, health personnel make visits to the school to carry out hearing, vision tests or dental inspection, etc. Parents are notified of these visits. Parents are also notified by the County Medical Officer if follow-up treatment is necessary. It is necessary for the school to be informed about any medical condition suffered by the child that may interfere with the learning process and/or be a danger to the child in school.

## **School Health Service**

The aim of the School Health Service is to ensure all school children are physically and emotionally healthy, so that they may benefit fully from their education. A healthy child has a better chance of learning. The Health Service can help and advise parents, children and teachers on health matters and, when necessary, is involved with health promotion in the school. Should you wish to contact the service, the telephone number is 01633 431685.

Help and advice can be given on various issues, e.g. hearing problems, bedwetting, soiling, and referrals can be made to other health disciplines.

If your child has head lice please inform the school. We will then be able to tell other parents to be extra vigilant when examining their child's hair. The recommended treatment is to use a shampoo recommended by a pharmacist and / or regular and thorough conditioning and combing hair.

Please report infectious illnesses to the school and check with your doctor as to the length of time you should keep your child home from school.

## **Curriculum for Wales**

At Padre Pio Catholic Primary School, we aim to provide our pupils with authentic, holistic opportunities within their learning. We provide learners with a range of “real life” opportunities that will hopefully be enjoyed thoroughly. As a school community we continue to design and deliver a curriculum that is personal and relevant to us and one that we are proud of.

Through the opportunities provided, we strive to ensure all our learners are:

- Proud to be valuable members of our Catholic school and display our Catholic virtues.
- Ambitious, capable learners who always work to the best of their abilities and never give up.
- Enterprising and creative contributors in the class, school, parish and community
- Healthy, happy and confident individuals who actively take part in many different experiences.

(These are based around the Core Purposes set out by the Welsh Assembly Government.)

### **What our learners will learn**

As well as RE, Literacy, Numeracy and digital skills, there are six areas of learning experiences (AoLEs):

- Humanities (Geography and History)
- Health and Well-Being
- Expressive Arts (Music, drama and Art)
- Languages, Literacy and Communication (Literacy, Welsh language as well as engagement with Modern Foreign languages further on in the school)
- Mathematics and Numeracy
- Science and Technology (Science, Design Technology, ICT and STEM opportunities)

In addition to the above, our curriculum will also cover:

- Human Rights
- Diversity and respecting differences
- Experience and skills for careers and the workplace (at an appropriate level)
- Learning about Local, National and International contexts
- Developmentally appropriate relationships

### **How we deliver our curriculum**

The staff have created a long-term curriculum map which states which AoLEs will be taught each half term. An overarching theme or context is the focus across the school each half term (e.g., “Let’s Celebrate” or “I Wonder..”). Pupil engagement and input is crucial to influence what learners learn- and at the start of each topic, learners are asked what they would like to be included

We endeavour to use a wide range of teaching strategies and resources both indoors and outside to ensure all of our learners reach their full potential and to stimulate a passion for lifelong learning.

We fully recognise that our world is changing, and we need new ideas and creative use of technology to ensure our learners have the necessary skills, knowledge and expertise to lead a fulfilling life as a valued member of society.

## **Organisation and Planning**

We plan our curriculum in two phases. We agree a long-term plan for each phase. This indicates what topics are to be taught in each term, and to which groups of children.

With our medium-term plans, we give clear guidance on the objectives and teaching strategies that we use when teaching each topic.

Our short-term plans are those that our teachers write on a weekly or daily basis. We use these to set out the learning objectives for each session, and to identify what resources and activities we are going to use in the lesson. The emphasis will be on children working in a practical way, through investigation and structured indoor and outdoor play/learning, using key skills so meeting Curriculum requirements.

## **Classroom Organisation**

Staff contribute to the development of the child's experience in the classroom in the following ways:

- by providing an environment where learning can take place;
- by enabling, supporting and extending children's learning, sharing as a partner in the process;
- by planning the curriculum to meet the learning needs and styles of children;
- by observing children in order to make judgements about how the learning is progressing;
- by making records of their observations and collecting other kinds of evidence (samples of work, photographs, data records) of children's development;
- by reviewing and evaluating their planning and provision in the light of their assessments of an individual child's progress and needs;
- by sharing with parents' information about their child's progress.

The teachers fully recognise their important responsibility as Primary School Teachers in laying down the foundations for each child's future.

## **Children with Additional Needs**

The curriculum in our school is designed to provide access and opportunity for all children who attend the school. If we think it necessary to adapt the curriculum to meet the needs of individual children, then we do so only after the parents of the child have been consulted.

## **Homework**

The school encourages regular involvement by parents in all subjects, for example, reading, spelling, and key skills development.

This year, we are trialling a new approach to homework based around the class theme/topic. At the start of each half term, every child will take home a grid of cross curricular activities that can be completed at home during the specified time.

In addition, parents and carers are encouraged to regularly share a book at home with their child and to supervise spelling and handwriting homework when set. Work may also be sent home due to a child's interest or need at the discretion of the Class Teacher or Headteacher; follow-up work may be given to be completed at home. Parents are asked to ensure that any work sent home is supervised.

## **School Hours**

08.55 - 15.05

## **Free Breakfast Club**

A school breakfast club operates in the school hall from 8.20am (no entry after 8.30am) until 8.45am. This is a free service and is available to all children. More information and an application form can be obtained via the school office.

School starts at 8.55am. A teacher or member of staff will be in your child's classroom from 8.45am - parents are requested not to leave their child unattended before this time unless the child attends the school breakfast club.

## **After School Childcare**

George Street After School Club operate a 'walking bus' which takes children from Padre Pio School to George Street School. Currently operating Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, 15.05-17.30. There is a charge for this service. ## **School Meals**

Torfaen Catering is responsible for providing the school meals service. Meals are free for pupils in all primary school year groups. Meals are cooked on the premises. A varied menu for the term is supplied in advance. A packed lunch is also available on request.

## **Snacks and Drinks**

The school has a Healthy Eating Policy. Pupils have access to water to drink (and milk for pupils in reception class, class 1 and 2) and should bring fruit as a snack. Pupils are not allowed to bring chewing gum to school. Glass bottles are also not permitted in school.

## **Security and Safety**

### **General**

The health and welfare of your children is of prime importance in Padre Pio School. In line with other schools throughout the country, increasing attention is being paid at Padre Pio School to all aspects of safety and security. Several security measures are in place including: digital CCTV surveillance and security lighting of the grounds and buildings; keypad locked entrance doors; playground gates are locked at all times other than the start and end of the school day; DBS checks on all staff and volunteers working directly with children.

### **Fire Drill**

Fire Drills are undertaken once a term to practise evacuation procedures.

### **Lockdown Procedures**

Lockdown procedures are undertaken once a term to practise procedures.

### **Parking on Site**

Parking on site is only permitted in the parking bays to the right of the school gate as you enter. Please do not park anywhere else as this puts the children in danger as they enter and leave the school grounds. If there are no bays available, please park outside the school gates. Pontypool United Rugby Club have kindly given permission for parents to use their car park at the beginning and end of the school day.

### **Toilet Facilities**

The toilet facilities in Padre Pio are very good. The children in Reception have access to their own toilets. In Years 1 & 2 and in Years 3 & 4 the children have access to shared unisex toilets in their cloakrooms. In Years 5 & 6, boys and girls have access to separate toilet facilities fitting with their need for more privacy. The school is also fortunate to have 3 further disabled toilets on the premises. Each toilet area also has washbasins, liquid soap and hand driers / paper towels. The toilets are thoroughly cleaned daily by the cleaners.

## After School and Extra Curricular Activities

We encourage all pupils to have a healthy lifestyle, and this includes participation in sporting events. During a typical academic year, the school teams participate in the following sporting events:

- rugby and football festivals
- cross-country running
- athletics
- cricket tournaments
- weekly swimming sessions for year 5 pupils

After school activities are provided by our teachers for the benefit of the children. Staff have given their time to arrange and lead a wide variety of extra-curricular clubs for the children. Pupils in year 3 to year 6 can attend a variety of after school activity clubs, including:

### Sport

The traditional team games of rugby and football are played during the autumn and winter months. Tennis and athletics take place in the summer term. Gymnastics and Dance are taught as units at intervals during the school year. Our aim in Padre Pio School is to provide the children with as wide a variety of sporting opportunities as we can in the school setting. We place an emphasis on fitness and sporting behaviour and encourage and guide the children to work together as a team and to also pursue individual excellence. We believe that competition does have a place within the curriculum and take part in outside events and matches for the older pupils. However, sporting behaviour is paramount and we give opportunities for children to represent the school whatever their abilities, so long as they are attending one of our sports clubs or are trying hard in their games lessons. We encourage parents to support their child's efforts and particularly to help with transport to sporting events for their child, as the cost of a coach is often beyond school finance. School kit for matches is provided. To help the school, we ask that parents ensure that kit is washed and returned to school promptly.

# Charging and Letting Policy

## Introduction

All education during school hours is free. We do not charge for any activity undertaken as part of the Curriculum for Wales.

## Visits

When organising school trips or visits which enrich the curriculum and educational experience of the children, the school invites parents to contribute to the cost of the trip. All contributions are voluntary. However, if we do not receive sufficient voluntary contributions, we may cancel a trip. If a trip goes ahead, it may include children whose parents have not paid any contribution. We do not treat these children differently from any others.

If a parent wishes their child to take part in a school trip or event but is unwilling or unable to make a voluntary contribution, we do allow the child to participate fully in the trip or activity. Sometimes the school pays additional costs to support the visit. Parents have a right to know how each trip is funded. The school provides this information on request.

If the school organises a residential visit in school time or mainly school time, which is to provide education directly related to the Curriculum for Wales, we do not make any charge for the education. However, we may make a charge to cover the cost of transport and do make a charge to cover the cost of board and lodging.

## Swimming

The school organises swimming lessons for all children in year 5. These take place in school time and are part of the Curriculum for Wales. We make no charge for this activity, but we may ask for a contribution towards the cost of transport. We inform parents when these lessons are to take place, and we ask parents for their written permission for their child to take part in swimming lessons.

## Receipts

Receipts are given for all amounts tendered which are £20 and over.

## Letting of premises

The Governing Body supports the development of all community groups use of the school through a flexible charging approach. This may include offering the premises free of charge or at reduced rates for a set period of time in order to assist a new group. Each application for use of the premises would be negotiated with the Headteacher in consultation with the governors.

## Arrangements for part or full remissions of charges

The Governing Body may provide financial support from the school budget or external grants for those families unable to meet the full cost of voluntary contributions or charges, on application to the Headteacher. The Recruitment and Resources Committee will be informed in general terms of the total provided for each activity.

## **Parental Contact**

Parents are welcome to visit the school. If they wish to see a member of staff, it is advisable to telephone the school office in advance to make an appointment.

A consultation afternoon/evening is arranged early in the Autumn Term. This is an opportunity for parents to give the class teachers any information they think is necessary about their children and to familiarise themselves as to how the new class is organised. Targets from the previous Summer Report will also be discussed. Parents' evenings are arranged later in the academic year when the child's progress and class work may be discussed.

Parents are welcome, and indeed encouraged, to get involved in school life - attend the various class and school Masses, assemblies and other regular events/celebrations which occur during the school year.

Parents/grandparents help with the 'non-teaching' aspect of the school day - taking small groups for reading etc. If you have a talent to share, or an hour to spare, please contact the Headteacher.

A newsletter is regularly emailed to parents/carers. The newsletter gives reports of achievements, advance notice of future events and reminders of the day to day running of our school.

A text messaging service is used to provide reminders and notices.

In accordance with Government legislation, School Governors present an Annual Report to Parents. Parents/Guardians can question/comment on items in the report.

## **Friends of Padre Pio (formerly PFA)**

The Friends of Padre Pio continues to do excellent work to support the school. All the money raised subsidises trips and in-school activities (e.g. supplies for Cookery and Art Clubs) and benefits all pupils / your children.

The Friends of Padre Pio organise a range of events including fetes, raffles, Easter Bonnet Parade, Bingo Night. We give our sincere thanks to all the staff, parents/guardians and other family members who help to organise and run fundraising activities, and our thanks all who support events. Please contact the school office if you want to help at any events.

## Complaints Procedure

The school has a Complaints Policy which should be adhered to. If you or your child were to be unhappy about something to do with the school, then we would like to know. We can only do something to improve the situation if we know about it. The purpose of the policy is to set out how concerns will be handled. It describes how anyone with a concern can set about having that concern dealt with and what then happens. The arrangements set out the three levels at which a concern will be considered. These are:

Stage 1 Informal discussion with Class Teacher or Headteacher.

Most situations can be clarified through a discussion with your child's class teacher or, if you feel it is more appropriate, with the headteacher (Informal Stage).

Stage 2 The formal complaint to the Headteacher.

If you are still unhappy with the school's response, then you can make a formal complaint in writing to the headteacher.

Stage 3 The formal complaint to the Governing Body.

If you feel the headteacher has been unable to deal effectively with your complaint you should write to the Chair of Governors, outlining your complaint. The governing body complaints committee will investigate the complaint and try to bring it to a satisfactory resolution.

As a school we hope that we can work with families to ensure that the formal complaint procedures are never required. However, if ever you do need to complain we will keep you fully informed of the outcome of your complaint. For stages 2 and 3 this will always be in writing.

Please visit our school website to download our school complaints policy and procedure. Copies of the document are also kept in the school office.

## **Attendance**

It is widely recognised that regular attendance at school is a key factor in raising children's attainment and for improving their future life opportunities. By law, pupils must attend regularly and punctually.

We strongly discourage holidays during term time, however, should you wish to take your child out of school then you will need to obtain a holiday request form from the school office or our website. All absences / requests for leave must be submitted in advance – please complete and return a request for leave to the school office.

Please note that if your child has attendance under 95% at the time of the holiday request, it is unlikely to be authorised except in exceptional circumstances. If you would like to discuss an application for leave or feel that there are exceptional circumstances which mean an authorised leave should be considered, please contact the school at the earliest opportunity.

In cases where children are taken out of school without approval, their absence will be recorded as unauthorised, and the school will discuss this with the Educational Welfare Service. Fixed penalty notices may be issued for an unauthorised absence where attendance is 90% or below in the current year and the previous year.

The school is working hard to reduce the number of unauthorised absences and would like to thank parents for their cooperation.

### **Please Keep School Informed**

If your child does not arrive in school, staff have no way of knowing where they are and if they are safe. Please let us know if your child will be absent and the reason for absence on the first morning of absence - please contact us on 01495 742074.

### **Punctuality**

As well as monitoring absence we are also concerned that pupils develop a routine of punctuality. Registration takes place at 8.55am and 1pm (1.30pm in infant classes). School gates will be locked at 9am – any pupils arriving after this time must enter via the main school entrance/school office and will be marked as late. Punctuality is regularly monitored by the school and by Torfaen Council's Education Welfare Service.

### **Reporting**

Attendance and punctuality are recorded in school registers and reported to/discussed with Torfaen Council's Education Welfare Service. It's also reported to parents during termly parent-teacher consultations and in end of year school reports. Overall attendance information will be recorded in the Governors' Annual Report to Parents/Carers (other than years where attendance is affected by exceptional circumstances, e.g. a pandemic). The school identifies an annual target for attendance each year and endeavours to meet this. The school attendance target (optional) for 2024-2025 was 92.5%; actual attendance for 2024-25 was 91.4%. The school attendance target (optional) for 2025-26 is 92.5%.
